FAO's Definition of Food Waste and Loss

- ☐ Food Waste food appropriate for human consumption being discarded, whether or not after it is kept beyond its expiry date or left to spoil.
- □ **Food Loss** food that unintentionally undergoes deterioration in quality or quantity as a result of food spills, spoils, bruising, wilting or other such damage as a result of infrastructure limitations at the production, storage, processing and distribution stages of the food lifecycle.



FAO's Definition of Food Waste and Loss Index


- **Food Loss Index** The Food Loss Index looks at what is lost during production or in the food supply chain before food reaches the retailers.
- Food Waste Index The Food Waste Index focuses on the food that is thrown away at the end of the supply chain by retailers and consumers.




Food Waste and Loss Index




Global Food Waste



3.5 million children (half of children under five years) die each year due to Poor nutrition

66 million primary school-age children (across the developing world) attend classes hungry


815 million are currently hungry due to:

UN Sustainable Development Goal

- Global food security and the end of world hunger by 2030;
- Achieving food security means that all individuals will have access, at all times, to enough nutritious food to live a healthy life;
- There is sufficient food produced (1.5X) in the world to feed the entirely of the world's Population.


Food Security according to FAO

- Availability of food;
- Accessibility of food;
- Utilization of food (i.e., Acquiring food safely and receiving a balance of nutrients);
- Stability of food supply (i.e. resiliency to shocks in the food supply system).
