
Why social work?

In Dhule district of Maharashtra, he has set an example by becoming a collector in the son of a poor ka. **Rajendra Bharood**'s life story is not only inspirational but an example for those people. Rajendra Bharud was so poor that even a photo of his father could not be clicked. His mother used to sell liquor, but when he was hungry his grandmother used to give him a couple of spoons of liquor.

Rajendra Bharud while interacting with a newspaper said that I was in my mother's womb at the same time that the shadow of the father had risen from my head. We were so poor that the father could not even take a photo of himself. I did not even get the privilege of seeing my father's appearance. The situation of the family was such that it was very difficult to get even one-time food. Our family of 10 lived in a small hut made of sugarcane weed. He further said that people had asked the mother to get an abortion. You have a son and a daughter. What is the need for a third child?

But my mother ignored people's talk and kept me alive. He told me that I am from Adivasi Bhil Samaj of Dhule district of Maharashtra. In my childhood, I was bitten by ignorance, superstition, poverty, unemployment and all kinds of addictions. Mother Kamala sister used to get ten rupees of wages. How could have passed through such a small amount? The requirements could not be met with only ten rupees. For this reason, the mother had to sell liquor so that the household expenses could be met.

Rajendra Bharood further told me that whoever I was was three years old. I used to cry when I was hungry. My crying used to cause trouble to drinkers. Some people used to put drops of alcohol in my mouth to silence me. Grandma would also give me some alcohol instead of milk so that hunger would disappear to some extent and I would be silent. A few days later, he got into the habit of alcohol. He also told that our medicine was only alcohol after a cold cough.

Rajendra Bharood said that he used to study outside the house sitting on the platform. But the people who used to come to drink alcohol used to have some passion. He used to give me some money for this as well. I bought some books with the same money. I studied hard and scored 95 percent marks in class 10 and 90 percent marks in 12th standard. Sitting in the medical entrance exam in 2006.

Through open merit, I got admission at Seth GS Medical College, Mumbai. In 2011, I filled the UPSC form. Passed the exam and became a collector. But, my mother did not know anything at first. When the people of the village, officers, leaders started coming to congratulate them, they came to know that Raju (from Dular) has passed the Collector's examination. She just kept crying.

Rajendra Bharood told that people used to say, what will they do by reading and writing, they will sell liquor like their mother. When I told this to my mother, she had vowed that I would make my son a doctor or a collector. But the mother did not know what UPSC is. He further said that whatever I am today, only because of my mother.

What we can you do as a Teacher?

- Listen to students and a maintain a perfect balance with students
- Invite inspiration/ideal person in Department or University who will motivate students to do some great work etc.
